Friend Football Coop

As the football season is coming to an end, the plans for next year are already underway. Schools across the state are seeing a decline in football participation and is becoming an epidemic nationally. Friend Public School is seeing the same trend with participation numbers decreasing which has stirred up conversations on what direction we want to take. Should we stay 8 man? Should we drop to 6 man? Or should we co-op with a neighboring district? The decision was made at the last regular board of education meeting to co-op with Exeter-Milligan in a two-year plan playing 8-man football. After two years, an evaluation of the program will take place to determine future years. Both community boards supported the coop unanimously and are excited for the opportunity it will provide for our students. Currently, Exeter-Milligan and Friend co-op in junior high football and are partners with the Purple Ribbon Meat program. Both programs have been very successful and a positive partnership already exists with our neighbors.

Both boards agreed to make the plan as equal and fair as possible. Many details will need to be ironed out in the future, but for now, the co-op will be in place and we will be known as EM-F. The plan will split home games between the two towns and coaches will be shared. Eventually we will need to determine team name, colors, mascot, etc. The plan will be to have student councils meet from each school and let them share their ideas with one other.

Enrollment and participation is also taking a toll on other activities in our school. Conversations will take place on additional co-oping and plans to offer our students competitive opportunities. These decisions do not need to take place immediately as coop agreements are not due to the state until the spring. We will continue to have these conversations and appreciate community feedback throughout the process.

The mission of our school district is "Committed to engaging all students, staff and community to ensure a diverse education through a culture of life-long learning". We are committed to providing opportunities to our students and are finding that ways of providing these opportunities for our students may look different than they did in the past. I know our students will be successful with these changes and that the community will support them no matter what color or name they choose.




FCCLA DLC

15 REWARDS TO CELEBRATE A GREAT REPORT CARD

Your child has worked hard at school and has a glowing report card to prove it. Time to reward them with these 15 ways to celebrate your star student's good grades and give them a pat on the back for a job well done.

- 1. Forms of Praise as Good Grades Rewards
- 2. Freebies-Many companies offer rewards to students who do well in school. Kids with good grades can take their report cards in to earn everything from free food to a free movie rental.
- 3. Bake a Cake-Bake something special, like one of the top 10 family cakes, as a reward. Get creative with a square cake and write with frosting to make a replica of your child's report card.
