## Superintendent's Desk

From the Superintendent: Mr. Anderson
Can you believe that the start of the 2022-23 school year is right around the corner? Hopefully, you all enjoyed the summer days with various activities and some rest and relaxation. With the end of one season, we are looking forward to a new school year as students come with the excitement of new teachers, class schedules and a brand new start.

It has been a full year as a Bulldog for me, and I have enjoyed and learned so much in my first year here. I look forward to my second with some changes. One of the constants in education is CHANGE. At FPS, we don't change for change's sake; we change when it benefits our students. Whether it is a learning management system, HVAC or new curriculum, we take change seriously and push for any change to benefit OUR kids.

One of the main changes is the addition of Canvas to the classroom. Some families and students are familiar with Canvas, while it will be new to others. Canvas is a web-based learning management system (LMS). It is used by many schools, colleges and universities to access and manage online course learning materials. Canvas will allow for students to access work and assignments from their computers and from anywhere where there is internet. During the pandemic, many schools moved to Canvas to help students learn at the end of the 2019-20 school year. Canvas has proven to help make school work accessible and give students a chance to work in many different locations on their laptops. Having our 7-12 students using Canvas also prepares them for trade school and college classes since many upper level institutions use Canvas or a similar product. Canvas was rolled out at the end of the 2021-22 school year and is expected to be in all of Friend Public School's 7-12 classrooms for the 2022-23 school year.

Besides a few changes in staffing and the addition of our learning management system, it has been a flurry of activity as custodians work to get the school ready. They have done an outstanding job and have been a joy to work with. You may also notice some changes around the school. We have already finished the playground drainage work. This should minimize standing water and ice on the playground throughout the school year. We are currently working on adding HVAC to the old gym and installing a scoreboard at the football field.

## Elementary Reminders:

* Please have your immunizations and physicals complete and turned into the office so you are able to start school. This is a state law.
* Any forms handed to you on the first day of school (handbook, internet safety, etc.) will need to be returned by Friday, August 19 ${ }^{\text {th }}$.
* For Kindergarten-6 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Grade, school runs from 8:00-3:25


## Ir. High and High School Reminders:

* Please have your immunizations and physicals complete and turned into the office so you are able to start class and participate in activities. This is a state law.

* The school dress code needs to be followed at school and all activities.
* Drop and Adds for classes need to be done between August 8-26 ${ }^{\text {th }}$. You'll need to fill out a form and have signatures from a parent, administrator, and teacher to complete the process.
* Students, please park in the north lot by the Catholic Church.
*Please walk the "catwalk" or sit in the old gym before the 8:00 bell, unless you are eating breakfast.
* Any forms handed to you on the first day of school (handbook, internet safety, etc.) will need to be returned by Friday, August 19th.
* If you would like to participate in Softball, Volleyball, or Football, practices start on August $8^{\text {th }}$. You will need to pay your \$30 Activity Fee (that covers you for the whole year and you'll get an activity pass as well). You will also get forms from your coaches that will need to be handed in prior to you being able to start practice. If you do not have these things completed, you will sit and watch the other students participate per NSAA rules.
* Cell phones need to be placed in the cell phone charts/turned into a designated classroom spot during class time.


## *School will run from 8:05-3:29. Please be on time to school and class.

*** If a student is missing school due to a medical appointment, the parents/guardian need to provide a doctor's note to the school for the absence to be counted as "excused". If the school does not receive a doctor's note within 1 day of the appointment, the absence will be counted as "unexcused". This is for all of our students PreK-12 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Grade.

## Upcoming Dates:

August $15^{\text {th }}$ : Walk to School Night/Get to Know Your Classroom Night for elementary (Preschool-6 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Grade) students and families from 5:30-6:30. This is an Open House! We cannot wait to see all of you!
August $15^{\text {th }}: 7^{\text {th }}$ Grade Orientation for incoming $7^{\text {th }}$ graders and their parents, 6:30-7:00 in the library August $15^{\text {th }}: 9^{\text {th }}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade sports parents/coaches and booster meeting at 7:00 in the new gym.
August 16 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ : First day of school (ALL students Preschool-12 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Grade) $=8: 05-2: 00$. You can enter at $7: 45$ if you are having breakfast. If you are NOT eating breakfast, you will need to be on the recess playground (elementary students) and for our secondary students you will need to be in the old gym. Please DO NOT come to school before 7:45 AM. Parents of elementary students, the best place to drop off your kids is the Kindergarten ramp doors. The buses drop off on the west side of the school.
Friday, August 19 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ : All forms need to be signed and handed into the office. It's your responsibility to get those to your parents and handed back into school.

Pre-School = 3 Year Olds=8:00-11:15, and 4 Year Olds= 12:15-3:25. Pre-School runs Mondays-Thursdays. No pre-school on Fridays.

- 7-12 grade students wishing to make changes to their class schedules may see Ms. Hottovy at school August 8-12 from 8:30-11:30 a.m. and 12:30-3:30 p.m.
- If you need to meet at a specific time, please schedule an appointment in advance by emailing Ms. Hottovy as soon as possible. Otherwise, students will be seen on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Be sure you have discussed proposed schedule changes with your parent(s)/guardian(s).
- It's a good idea to have multiple options in mind just in case your first choice doesn't work.
- Remember that changing your schedule is a team decision made by you, your parent(s)/guardian(s), your teachers, your school counselor, and your principal.
- Once school starts on August 16, students have 5 days to finalize their schedules. No changes can be made after August 22.
- Students who earned community service hours over the summer should return completed paperwork to Ms. Hottovy during the first week of school.
- Seniors -- if you haven't started exploring colleges, now is the time.
- Which school is the best fit for you? Which school offers programs that will meet your needs and interests? How will you pay to attend a certain college or university?
- Many of these questions can be answered ONLY after you go on a college visit!
- You will want to have begun narrowing your college choices before Apply2College Day in early October.
- The goal is for you to have applied to at least 3 colleges before Thanksgiving.
- Most colleges and universities are ready to schedule on-campus visits. Check their websites to schedule a visit.

## PARENTS/GUARDIANS OF JUNIORS AND SENIORS...PLEASE TAKE NOTE!

All juniors and seniors will be attending an Education Quest college planning and financial aid session on October 5. An informational letter will be sent home with students the middle of September.

Parents and guardians -- you are encouraged to join us!
The college planning and financial aid session will run from 10:00 am to approximately 10:45 a.m. in the media center. Juniors will then be excused back to class, and the seniors will take part in Apply2College Day from 11:00 to noon.

Juniors and seniors will have been encouraged to create an account on EducationQuest.org and start exploring all this organization has to offer, including information about careers and colleges.

These students have also been encouraged to schedule a college visit soon!

- Juniors are allowed one excused absence for a college visit. It's never too early to start looking!
- Seniors are allowed two excused absences for college visits. I highly encouraged them to get one in ASAP since they'll be taking part in Apply2College Day on October 5.
- Parent permission forms for college visits are due BEFORE the student is gone from school or the absence will not be considered excused. Forms are available in the office.

ACT notes: Juniors are scheduled to take the ACT on March 21, 2023. Seniors are highly encouraged to retake the ACT between now and December to make sure they have the highest score possible to impact potential financial aid and scholarships.

This school year will see a return to traditional meal pricing. For the last two years, all meals have been free of charge thru special USDA COVID Waivers.

Families can qualify for three different tiers of pricing within the School Meals Program: Free, Reduced, or Full Pay. Please read "Attachment B" included in this newsletter for details on who qualifies.

If a family qualified for Free or Reduced meals thru "Direct Certification" (i.e. SNAP, Medicaid, etc), they have been sent a letter in July notifying them of that fact. They do not need to return any further paperwork. The only exception to this would be if a family qualifies directly for Reduced pricing thru Medicaid, and they believe their income would qualify for Free, they may send in an Income Application (Attachment C).

If a family believes they may qualify for either Free or Reduced pricing, and have not received a letter, please complete the following "Attachment C: Meal Application" for your household and return to the school office.

Students meal account balances should be kept current. You may make payments for their accounts by cash or check, paid at the school office or in the lunch line, or by credit/debit card thru the $\mathrm{e}^{\sim}$ funds website https://payments.efundsforschools.com/v3/districts/56376. There is a small fee for using e ${ }^{\sim}$ funds transactions. If interested, contact the office to obtain your child's PowerSchool ID number to set up a $e^{\sim}$ funds account. Also please note that any $e^{\sim}$ funds accounts not used in the past year will need to be reactivated. You will be contacted weekly if your child's account balance falls below zero.

## Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Friend Public School offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs $\$ 1.95$; lunch costs $\$ 2.90$ for elementary and $\$ 3.15$ for secondary students. Your children may qualify for free or reduced price meals. Reduced price is $\$ .30$ for breakfast and $\$ .40$ for lunch. If your child(ren) qualified for free or reduced price meals at the end of last school year, you must submit a new application by September 28, 2022, in order to avoid an interruption in meal benefits.

This packet includes an application for free or reduced price meal benefits and a set of detailed instructions. Below are some common questions and answers to help you with the application process.

## 1. WHO CAN GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS?

- All children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) are eligible for free meals.
- Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
- Children participating in their school's Head Start program are eligible for free meals.
- Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals.
- Children may receive free or reduced price meals if your household's income is within the limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. Your children may qualify for free or reduced price meals if your household income falls at or below the limits on this chart.

2. HOW DO I KNOW IF MY CHILDREN QUALIFY AS HOMELESS, MIGRANT, OR RUNAWAY? Do the members of your household lack a permanent address? Are you staying together in a shelter, hotel, or other temporary housing arrangement? Does your family relocate on a seasonal basis? Are any children living with you who have chosen to leave their prior family or household? If you believe children in your household meet these descriptions and haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail: FPS, Derek Anderson, Superintendent, 402-947-2781, derek.anderson@friendschool.org
3. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT AN APPLICATION FOR EACH CHILD? No. Use one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Michele Johnson-Clouse, FPS, PO Box 67, Friend NE 68359
4. SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE ALREADY APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? No, but please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. If any children in your household were missing from your eligibility notification, contact Michele Johnson-Clouse, FPS, PO Box 67, Friend NE 68359 immediately.
5. CAN I APPLY ONLINE? You are encouraged to complete an online application instead of a paper application if your school district makes this option available. The online application has the same requirements and will ask you for the same information as the paper application. (Not available at Friend Public School).
6. MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT A NEW ONE? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year. If you do not send in a new application that is approved by the school or you have not been notified that your child is eligible for free meals, your child will be charged the full price for meals.
7. I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please send in an application.
8. WILL THE INFORMATION I GIVE BE CHECKED? Yes. We may also ask you to send written proof of the household income you report.
9. IF I DON'T QUALIFY NOW, MAY I APPLY LATER? Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
10. WHAT IF I DISAGREE WITH THE SCHOOL'S DECISION ABOUT MY APPLICATION? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Derek Anderson, Superintendent, 402-947-2781, derek.anderson@friendschool.org
11. MAY I APPLY IF SOMEONE IN MY HOUSEHOLD IS NOT A U.S. CITIZEN? Yes. You, your children, or other household members do not have to be U.S. citizens to apply for free or reduced price meals.
12. WHAT IF MY INCOME IS NOT ALWAYS THE SAME? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make $\$ 1000$ each month, but you missed some work last month and only made $\$ 900$, put down that you made $\$ 1000$ per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
13. WHAT IF SOME HOUSEHOLD MEMBERS HAVE NO INCOME TO REPORT? Household members may not receive some types of income we ask you to report on the application, or may not receive income at all. Whenever this happens, please write a 0 in the field. However, if any income fields are left empty or blank, those will also be counted as zeroes. Please be careful when leaving income fields blank, as we will assume you meant to do so.
14. WE ARE IN THE MILITARY. DO WE REPORT OUR INCOME DIFFERENTLY? Your basic pay and cash bonuses must be reported as income. If you get any cash value allowances for off-base housing, food, or clothing, it must also be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. Any additional combat pay resulting from deployment is also excluded from income.
15. WHAT IF THERE ISN'T ENOUGH SPACE ON THE APPLICATION FOR MY FAMILY? List any additional household members on a separate piece of paper, and attach it to your application. Contact Michele Johnson-Clouse, 402-947-2781 to receive a second application.
16. MY FAMILY NEEDS MORE HELP. ARE THERE OTHER PROGRAMS WE MIGHT APPLY FOR? To find out how to apply for SNAP or other assistance benefits, please go online to ACCESSNebraska.ne.gov or call 1-800-383-4278.
